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# About This Guide

Thank you for choosing the Polycom<sup>®</sup> VVX<sup>TM</sup> 1500 phone. The phone is a business media phone that combines advanced business telephony, one-touch video, real-time presence, and integrated business applications into one seamless, lifelike communications experience.

The phone provides a powerful, yet flexible IP communications solution, delivering excellent video and voice quality. The high-resolution color graphic display supplies content for call information, multiple languages, directory access, and system status. The phone supports advanced functionality, including multiple call and flexible line appearances, HTTPS secure provisioning, presence, custom ring tones, and local audio and video conferencing.

Some of the key features include:

- Seven inch diagonal color touch screen
- Support for Polycom HD Voice<sup>™</sup> technology
- Privacy shutter for the video camera
- Adjustable base, display, and camera angle
- USB port for applications
- Ability to use a Power over Ethernet (PoE) power source

# **Setting Up Your Phone**

To set up the phone, do the following:

- 1. Adjust the stand. See Adjusting the Stand, below.
- **2.** Connect the ferrite clamps to the network cable (and to the optional computer cable, if you are connecting a computer to your phone). See Attaching Ferrite Clamps on page 1-5.
- **3.** Connect the phone to the network and a power source. See Connecting Network and Power Sources on page 1-5.
- **4.** Connect phone components. See Connecting the Handset and Handset Cord on page 1-8 and Connecting Optional Components on page 1-8.
- **5.** Adjust the screen and camera. See Adjusting the Screen on page 1-12 and Adjusting the Camera on page 1-13.

### Adjusting the Stand

Your phone is shipped with the stand positioned flat against the phone. To use the phone, adjust the stand so that the phone is in a more upright position.

You can adjust the stand to one of five positions. The lowest position is labeled MIN, and the highest position is labelled MAX.

The following figure shows the MIN and MAX labels for the stand.



#### To adjust the stand:

**1.** With the back of the phone (and the stand) facing you, push the button protruding from the side of the phone. When you push the button, the stand unlocks and can move.



**2.** Lift the stand until it touches the back of the phone (the position labelled **MIN**), and then release the button to lock the stand in place. This is the lowest, and most stable, position for your phone.



The following figure shows the phone in its lowest position.



There are four, more upright, positions for your phone. Starting with the stand in its lowest position, push the button, slowly move the stand forward, and then release the button to lock the stand in the next position. Do not force the stand to move past the **MAX** position, or your phone will be unstable.

Note

If you need to store or ship your phone, you can move the stand past the MAX position so that the stand lies toward the front of the phone.

### **Attaching Ferrite Clamps**

Your phone package includes two ferrite clamps. You must attach a ferrite clamp to the network cable and to the computer cable (if you are connecting a computer to your phone) before you attach the cables to your phone.

#### To attach a ferrite clamp to the network cable or PC cable:

>> Clamp a ferrite clamp around the cable.



### **Connecting Network and Power Sources**

Note

Before you connect the network cable to your phone, make sure you attach a ferrite clamp to the cable (see Attaching Ferrite Clamps, above).

There are two ways to connect your phone to the network and a power source. Your system administrator will advise you which method to use. (If your phone is already connected to the network and a power source, go directly to Connecting the Handset and Handset Cord on page 1-8.)

You can use one of the following methods:

- Connecting the Phone Using a Power Over Ethernet Source
- Connecting the Phone Using AC Power

#### Connecting the Phone Using a Power Over Ethernet Source

Using the supplied network cable, the phone can be powered from a Power over Ethernet (PoE) compliant switch or hub. Power over Ethernet is the default connection for your phone.

The following figure shows how to connect the phone using a PoE source.



#### To connect the phone using a PoE source:

>> Plug the network cable between the LAN jack on the phone and an available power and data port on the in-line power switch.

#### **Connecting the Phone Using AC Power**

To connect the phone using AC power, you require the optional AC Power Kit, containing a Power Adapter and Regional Power Cord.

**Note** The regional power cord is country-specific. The power cord shown below may differ from the one in your kit.

The following figure shows how to connect the phone using AC power.



#### To connect the phone using AC power:

- 1. Connect the network cable between the LAN jack on the phone and the LAN port on the wall or hub/switch device port.
- **2.** Connect the DC plug on the power adapter to the 48V DC jack marked on the phone.
- **3.** Connect the regional power cord between the power adapter and the wall outlet.

### **Connecting the Handset and Handset Cord**

Connect one end of the handset cord to the end of the handset, and the other end of the cord to the Handset jack on the phone.

#### **Connecting an Optional Headset**

Attach a headset to listen to phone audio through a headset, rather than a handset or speakerphone. You attach a headset to the Headset jack on the back of the phone.



The following figure shows how to connect a headset to the Headset jack on the phone.

#### **Connecting an Optional USB Flash Drive**

Attach a removable USB flash drive to your phone to do the following:

- Record and play back audio from your phone.
- Display images on your phone's idle screen.

You attach the USB flash drive to the USB port on the right side of your phone. The USB port is behind a door you flip down. The following figure shows how to connect a USB flash drive to the USB port on the phone.



When you attach a USB flash drive to your phone, the message "Storage media

attached" displays. The USB flash drive icon,

, displays on the status

bar on the touch screen.

#### **Connecting Optional Headphones**

Attach headphones to your phone to listen to phone audio or recorded calls.

You attach the headphones to the 3.5mm connector on the side of your phone, located behind a door you flip down. The connector is an unamplified line-out connector only.



The following figure shows the 3.5mm connector on the side of your phone.

When you attach headphones to your phone, the message "Auxiliary output

active" displays. The headphone icon, (), displays on the status bar on the touch screen. When you remove the headphones, the message "Auxiliary output inactive" displays.

#### Connecting an Optional Computer

You can connect a computer to your phone. You may want to connect a computer, for example, if you only have one LAN port and you want to connect your computer to the network through the phone.

To connect a computer to the phone, you need the optional Computer Cable and a ferrite clamp (included in the phone package). Attach the ferrite clamp to the Computer Cable before you attach the cable to your phone (see Attaching Ferrite Clamps on page 1-5).

You attach a computer to the PC connector on the back of the phone.



The following figure shows how to connect a computer to the PC connector on the phone.

## Adjusting the Screen





### Adjusting the Camera

To transmit video, make sure you slide open the privacy shutter.

The following figure shows the privacy shutter centered above the touch screen. Open the privacy shutter using the privacy shutter adjuster (located along the top edge, above the camera).



You can adjust the angle of the camera by rolling the camera barrel located directly behind the camera lens.

The following figure shows how to adjust the camera up or down.

# **Registering the Phone**

Generally, your phone will be deployed with multiple other phones. In this case, your system administrator will configure the phone parameters beforehand, so that after you set up your phone, the phone will be registered and ready to use.

If your phone is not part of a large phone deployment, your phone may not be registered after you set it up. Before you use your phone, you or your system administrator will have to register it.

2	Speakerphone	Provides ringer and hands-free (speakerphone) audio output. To use the speakerphone, see Placing Calls on page 3-6, Answering Calls on page 3-12, and Ending Calls on page 3-15.
3	Headphone connector	Allows you to connect headphones to the phone.
4	USB connector	Allows you to connect a USB flash drive to display pictures on your phone, and to record and play back calls.

## Navigating Menus, Lists, and Fields

- Press the keys on the phone console

#### Using the "Keyboard" on the Touch Screen

You can use the phone's "keyboard" to quickly update field information.

#### To use the "keyboard" on the touch screen to enter or edit data:

**1.** To update a field, tap the field.

The keyboard icon, , displays next to the screen title.

**2.** Tap

## **Obtaining the Best Performance from Video Calls and Conferences**

Use these tips when you host a video call or conference:

- Check the near-site video to make sure it is clear, bright, and sharp. For information on adjusting camera settings, see Updating Camera Settings on page 2-32.
- Use the handset or a headset if you are in an open environment.
- Be aware of latency when speaking.
- Avoid bright lights or windows behind you (backlight). If the camera faces a window or bright lights, you may have to adjust the camera settings. To adjust camera settings, see Updating Camera Settings on page 2-32.
- Avoid wearing bright colors, all-light or all-dark clothing, or "busy" patterns (such as small checks or narrow stripes). Light pastels and muted colors look the best on the screen.
- Mute the microphone if you have to cough, move, or shuffle papers, etc.
- In a conference call, mute your microphone when you are not speaking, especially in noisy environments.
- Avoid tapping the microphone or rustling papers near the microphone.
- Make sure that you can see and hear the far-site participants.
- Speak in your normal voice without shouting.
- Use natural gestures when you speak.

## **Cleaning the Touch Screen**

Periodically, you may need to clean the touch screen. Fingerprints tend to show up more on a color display.

Before you clean the touch screen, disable the screen so you do not activate phone features while you wipe the glass. While the touch screen is disabled, all soft keys are disabled. You can enable the touch screen again by pressing any key on the phone console.

To answer a call while the touch screen is disabled, pick up the handset. Or, to

use the speakerphone, press  $| \mathbf{A} \rangle$ , and then tap the **Answer** soft key.

### To clean the touch screen:

**1.** Tap **Settings > Basic > Screen Clean**.

The screen is disabled. The message "Touch screen is disabled. Press any key to exit" displays.

- **2.** Wipe the glass with a clean, lint-free cloth.
- **3.** To enable the touch screen again, press any key on the phone console.

## Changing the Language

Your phone supports several languages.

## Changing the Appearance of Time and Date

The time and date appear on the graphic display of the phone. If the phone cannot obtain a time and date, the display will flash. Contact your system administrator if either the time or date is incorrect.

You can select from various formats for the time and date display, including whether the time or date displays first (clock order). You can also turn the time and date display off, so it doesn't display on the screen. Select and set options that are right for you.

This feature is useful for permanent or full-time headset users. You can set up your phone so that all incoming and outgoing calls use your headset. At any time, you can switch to handset or speakerphone mode.

To use Headset Memory Mode, you must enable, and then activate, Headset Memory Mode. If you switch to handset or speakerphone mode, you deactivate Headset Memory Mode. To switch back to Headset Memory Mode, you must activate it again.

You can change the background picture that displays on your phone. By default, your screen displays a blue-patterned background that is named "Default."

Your system administrator sets up the background images for your phone. If no background images are set up, only the blue-patterned background ("Default") is available. If you want, you can set up a picture of your own as the background image. For more information, see Setting a Picture on Your USB Flash Drive as the Background Picture on Your Phone on page 2-16.

Note	You may want to view your pictures like a slide show (or just view one picture) without setting up a screen saver that automatically starts each time your phone is idle a certain amount of time. This is the Picture Frame feature. For more information, see Displaying the Pictures that are Stored on Your USB Flash Drive on page 2-14.

Note

When you view Launch Pad applications (either from Launch Pad or from the idle screen), your phone is considered idle, and a screen saver (if set up) will still display. For more information on Launch Pad and viewing applications, see Using the Launch Pad on page 4-31.

You can set up a screen saver to display the pictures stored on a USB flash drive. The screen saver will automatically start each time your phone is idle a certain amount of time. You can stop the screen saver at any time and return to the idle screen by tapping the touch screen. If your phone is idle again (for a specified period of time), the screen saver will start again.

To set up a screen saver of your pictures, you need to set up certain screen saver settings, place your pictures on a USB flash drive, and attach the USB flash drive to the phone. Your phone can only display the screen saver when the USB flash drive is attached to your phone.

- **4.** Specify the folder in which you stored your images on the USB flash drive, and the length of time you want each image to display:
  - In the **Folder** field, enter the name of the folder in which you placed your images on the USB flash drive.

If you did not place the pictures in a folder (that is, you placed your pictures in the root directory), do not enter a folder name.

 Tap the **Time Per Image** field, and then enter the number of seconds you want each picture to display.

You can enter a minimum of 3 seconds and a maximum of 300 seconds. The default is 5 seconds.

**5.** Tap the **Save** soft key.

If the message "No pictures found" displays after you tap the Save soft key, there are no pictures in the folder you specified, or in the root directory (if you did not enter a folder name). Go back and make sure the information you entered is correct.

**6.** Tap to return to the idle screen.

From the idle screen, tap Settings > Basic > Preferences > Screen Saver.

## Stopping and Disabling a Screen Saver

You can stop a screen saver at any time, and display the idle screen, by tapping the touch screen. After your phone is idle for the specified period of time, the screen saver will start again.

You can disable a screen saver (prevent it from starting, even if your phone has been idle for the specified period of time) by doing the following:

Removing the USB flash drive.

The screen saver will not display until you attach the USB flash drive again (and your phone has been idle for the period of time you specified).

• Disabling the **Screen Saver** setting. When you disable the setting, the screen saver will not display, even though the USB flash drive is still attached.

## Displaying the Pictures that are Stored on Your USB Flash Drive

You can view the pictures that are stored on your USB flash drive at any time, without setting up a screen saver that automatically starts each time your phone is idle a certain amount of time. This is called the Picture Frame feature. You can display your pictures as thumbnails, one-by-one (like a slide show), or display just one picture. When you decide to stop viewing your pictures, the idle screen displays, and your pictures will not display again until you choose to display them (unless a screen saver is set up, or you enable a screen saver).

Before you can display your pictures, confirm the following:

- Your pictures are on the USB flash drive, and the USB flash drive is attached to your phone.
- You have specified the folder the pictures are in on your USB flash drive.

For information on how to place pictures on a USB flash drive, connect the USB flash drive to your phone, and specify a folder, see Setting Up a Screen Saver on page 2-9.

### To display the pictures on your USB flash drive:

- **1.** Do one of the following:
  - − From the idle screen, tap > Picture Frame.
  - Tap Features > Removable Storage Media >
     Picture Frame.

- Press (), and then tap the **Picture Frame** icon.

Your pictures will display one-by-one (like a slide show). Six keys display beneath your pictures.

The following figure shows a picture that is stored on a USB flash drive, and the six keys that display so you can display the pictures on your USB flash drive as thumbnails, one-by-one, or one picture only.

The sixth key, *integrable*, allows you to set the picture as the background image for your phone (see Setting a Picture on Your USB Flash Drive as the Background Picture on Your Phone on page 2-16).



# Setting a Picture on Your USB Flash Drive as the Background Picture on Your Phone

You can set a picture that is stored on your USB flash drive as the background picture on your phone. When you set one of your pictures as the background picture, the picture will display as "Local File" in the Backgrounds list (see Updating the Background Picture on page 2-8).

Before you can set a picture on your USB flash drive as the background picture, confirm the following:

- The picture is on the USB flash drive, and the USB flash drive is attached to your phone.
- You have specified the folder the picture is in on your USB flash drive.

For more information on placing a picture on your USB flash drive, connecting the USB flash drive to your phone, and specifying a folder, see Setting Up a Screen Saver on page 2-9.

## To set a picture on your USB flash drive as the background picture on your phone:

**1.** Do one of the following:



- Tap Features > Removable Storage Media > Picture Frame.
- Press  $(\mathbf{APP})$ , and then tap the **Picture Frame** icon.

Your pictures will display, one-by-one.

**2.** To set a picture as the background picture for your phone, wait for the

picture to display, and then tap  $\swarrow$ . Or, press  $\triangleleft$  or  $\triangleright$  to display

the picture, and then tap  $\wedge$ .

To re-set the default background image, see Updating the Background Picture on page 2-8, but select **Default** for the background image.

## **Changing the Backlight Intensity**

Backlight intensity on the phone has three components:

- Backlight On
- Backlight Idle
- Maximum Intensity

You can modify the Backlight On intensity and the Backlight Idle intensity separately. You can select high, medium, low, and off levels for both.

When you modify the Maximum Intensity, you modify the entire backlight intensity scale. For example, if you decrease the Maximum Intensity, the low, medium, and high levels for both Backlight On and Backlight Idle intensities decrease.

The Backlight On intensity applies to following events:

- Any key press
- Incoming calls
- Ending a call, holding a call, resuming a call by the other party
- A voice message received

If you do not press any keys on the phone, after 20 seconds of the backlight turning on, the backlight dims (or changes) to medium in the following cases:

- A call is in progress
- A call is on hold
- There is an incoming call (ringing)
- There is an outgoing call (ringing back)
- Any menu shows on the display

In all other cases, the Backlight Idle intensity applies.

To modify the backlight intensity:

- **1.** Tap **Settings > Basic > Backlight Intensity**.
- 2. Tap Backlight On Intensity.

You can choose a distinctive ring tone for your phone to identify it when it rings. Or, you can choose distinctive ring tones for different lines on your phone.

> Settings > Basic > Ring Type.

### To select a ring tone for your phone or a specific line:

1. Tap

The Ring Type screen displays.

(If multiple lines are configured on your phone, the Line Select screen displays instead, and you have to select the line to which to apply the ring type. Then, the Ring Type screen displays.)



**2.** Tap the ring type you want, and then tap the **Select** soft key. To hear the ring type before you change it, tap the **Play** soft key.

The default ring type is Low Trill.

Note If you set up your phone with a silent ring, tap the ringing Line Key or the **Answer** soft key to answer the call. If your handset is off hook, the call is routed to the handset. If your handset is on hook, the call is routed to the speaker.

## **Disabling and Stopping Video**

You can disable or stop the transmission of near-site video. However, you cannot disable or stop far-site video. If your phone receives far-site video, your phone always displays far-site video.

By default, your phone always transmits near-site video, unless you do the following:

- Stop the transmission of near-site video on a call-by-call basis. During a call, you can choose to start and stop video at any time. For more information, see Handling Video Calls on page 3-3.
- Disable your phone from automatically transmitting near-site video at the start of all calls. (If you disable your phone in this way, you still have the option to start and stop video during the call.) For more information, see Updating Video Settings, below.

If you stop or disable video, 🔀 will display next to near-site video.

Your system administrator can configure your phone so that your phone cannot transmit and receive video at all, even on a call-by-call basis.

## **Updating Video Settings**

This setting automatically enables your phone to transmit video at the start of all calls. When disabled, your phone will not automatically

transmit video at the start of all calls, and *solution* will display next to near-site video during video calls.

To enable or disable this setting, tap the Auto Start Video Tx field's highlighted box. From the drop-down list, tap **Enabled** or **Disabled**.

The default setting is Enabled.

If you disable this setting, you can still transmit video on a call-by-call basis. To transmit video during a specific call, see Handling Video Calls on page 3-3. However, your phone will not automatically transmit video at the start of the next call, unless you enable the setting beforehand.

If you enable or disable this setting, the change will affect the next call, not the current call.

### Auto Video Full Screen

Note

This setting automatically enables your phone to display far-site video on the full screen when you answer a call from a video endpoint. When you disable this setting, far-site video will display in the window in the center of the touch screen.

To enable or disable this setting, tap the field name, and then tap the field's highlighted box. From the drop-down list, tap **Enabled** or **Disabled**.

The following figure shows what displays when you enable your phone to display far-site video on the full screen when you answer a call from a video endpoint. (Depending on the video endpoint, you may or may not see black bars.)



## Updating the Way Video Displays in the Window in the Center of the Screen and on the Full Screen

Adjust the appearance of video images so that the video that displays in the window in the center of the touch screen, and on the full screen, display normal, full, or cropped images.

**Note** Depending on the video endpoint, black bars may appear on the top, bottom, or sides of the video image.

### To update the way video displays in the window in the center of the screen and on the full screen:

1. Tap Settings > Basic > Video > Video Screen Mode.

The Video Screen Mode screen displays.



**2.** Tap, and then adjust the following settings:

#### Video Screen Mode (Window)

Adjusts the video image that displays in the window in the center of the touch screen. You can select these settings:

**Normal** – The video image is displayed using correct proportions. If necessary, black bars appear on the top, bottom, or sides of the window to maintain the correct aspect ratio.

Full – The video image is stretched to fill the window.

**Crop** – Black bars do not appear, and the video image is re-sized to maintain the correct aspect ratio. Any parts of the image that do not fit within the window are cropped.

To select the setting you want, tap the field name, and then tap the field's highlighted box. From the drop-down list, tap the setting you want.

The default setting is Normal.

### Video Screen Mode (Full Screen)

Adjusts the video image that displays on the full screen. You can select these settings:

**Normal** – The video image is displayed using correct proportions. If necessary, black bars appear on the top, bottom, or sides of the touch screen to maintain the correct aspect ratio.

Full – The video image is stretched to fill the touch screen.

**Crop** – Black bars do not appear, and the video image is re-sized to maintain the correct aspect ratio. Any parts of the image that do not fit within the touch screen are cropped.

To select the setting you want, tap the field, and then tap the field's highlighted box. From the drop-down list, tap the setting you want.

The default setting is Normal.

**3.** Tap the **Save** soft key.

### Updating the Way the PIP displays

You can update the way the PIP displays. For example, when you are in full screen mode (i.e., viewing the far or near site on the full screen), you can disable the PIP so the PIP doesn't display. When you are in full screen mode, you can also enable the PIP to display next to ("side-by-side" mode), rather than over ("PIP" mode), the full screen video.



The following figure shows the PIP disabled in full screen mode. (Depending on the video endpoint, you may or may not see black bars.)

The following figure shows the PIP when it displays next to ("side-by-side" mode), rather than over, full screen video.



The following figure shows the PIP when it displays over ("PIP" mode), rather than next to, full screen video. (Depending on the video endpoint, you may or may not see black bars.)



To update the way the PIP displays:

Tap Settings > Basic > Video > Local Camera View.
 The Local Camera View screen displays.



**2.** Tap, and then adjust the following settings:

#### Local Camera View (Full Screen)

Enables or disables the PIP from displaying when you view the near or far site on the full screen.

To select the setting you want, tap the field, and then tap the field's highlighted box. From the drop-down list, tap **Enabled** or **Disabled**.

The default setting is Enabled.

Local Camera View Mode (Full Screen)

Sets whether you want the PIP to display over or next to full screen video.

You can select these settings:

**Side-by-Side** – Displays the PIP next to (rather than over) the full screen video.

PIP – Displays the PIP over the full screen video.

The default setting is side-by-side.

Note If you select "PIP," as well as update the way full screen video displays (by choosing "Full" or "Crop" mode), the full screen video will display on the entire screen (without black sidebars). To choose "Full" or "Crop" mode, see Updating the Way Video Displays in the Window in the Center of the Screen and on the Full Screen, above.

To select the setting you want, tap the field, and then tap the field's highlighted box. From the drop-down list, tap **Side-by-Side** or **PIP**.

**3.** Tap the **Save** soft key.

### Updating Camera Settings

You can change the clarity of near-site video, including the brightness, contrast, and sharpness levels of the video image. These settings affect how near-site video displays on your phone and on other phones.

**Note** If you place your phone so that the camera faces a bright light source (for example, a bright window), you may need to increase the camera's brightness, contrast, and sharpness levels so the far site can see you better. To see how you will look to the far site, view the PIP.
#### To change the clarity of near-site video:

**1.** Tap **Settings > Basic > Video > Camera Settings**.

**2.** Tap, and then adjust, the following camera settings:

**Note** If your camera points to a bright light source, increase the brightness, contrast, and sharpness levels so the near site will be more clear.

- Target Frame Rate – sets how smooth near-site video displays.

Tap the **Up** or **Down** soft key to set the rate, and then tap the **Save** soft key.

You can set a rate between 5 (least smooth) and 30 (most smooth). The default rate is 25.

- Brightness Level – sets how bright near-site video will be.

Tap the **Up** or **Down** soft key to set the level, and then tap the **Save** soft key.

You can set a level between 0 (dimmest) and 6 (brightest). The default level is 3.

- Saturation Level – sets how much color near-site video displays.

Tap the **Up** or **Down** soft key to set the level, and then tap the **Save** soft key.

You can set a level between 0 (lowest) and 6 (highest). The default level is 3.

 Contrast Level – sets the difference in brightness between the light and dark areas of near-site video.

Tap the **Up** or **Down** soft key to set the level, and then tap the **Save** soft key.

You can set a level between 0 (no contrast increase) and 4 (noise reduction contrast). The default level is 0.

- Sharpness Level – sets the clarity of detail in near-site video.

Tap the **Up** or **Down** soft key to set the level, and then tap the **Save** soft key.

You can set a level between 0 (lowest) and 6 (highest). The default level is 3.

 Flicker Avoidance – adjusts the flickering (caused by AC power) of near-site video captured by the camera sensor.

Tap the **Select Environment** field's highlighted box. From the drop-down list, tap **Auto** (to automatically detect flicker), **50 Hz** (flicker avoidance for Europe and Asia), or **60 Hz** (flicker avoidance for North America). Then, tap the **Save** soft key.

The default is Auto.

### Updating Power Saving Settings

Your phone is set up with a power-saving mode that turns off the touch screen to conserve energy. Your phone enters power-saving mode after it has been idle for a certain period of time and its camera doesn't detect motion. Your phone will not enter power-saving mode if it detects motion (for example, if you are near the phone), even if the phone has been idle for the period of time you specified.

You can configure the period of time that the phone is idle ("idle timeout") before the touch screen turns off (if the camera does not detect motion). You can configure different idle timeouts for office hours and off hours (evenings and weekends).



During off hours, the touch screen displays "Off Hours Mode" on the status bar.

During power-saving mode, the LED on the top-right of the phone slow-blinks red to indicate that the phone has power and is ready to use, but is in power-saving mode. Your phone will exit power-saving mode if the camera detects motion or a phone event occurs (for example, an incoming call or message).

If a screen saver is enabled on your phone, power-saving mode will still occur. For example, if a screen saver is set up to display after the phone is idle for five minutes, and power-saving mode is set up to turn off the touch screen after the phone is idle for 15 minutes, the touch screen will turn off 10 minutes after the screen saver starts (if the camera doesn't detect motion).

The power-saving settings you can update are:

- Office Hours When you start work and how long you are in the office each day.
- Timeouts The period of time the phone should be idle before the touch screen turns off.
- User Detection The sensitivity of the camera to detect motion so that the phone can enter power-saving mode (if it doesn't detect motion) or exit power-saving mode and display the idle screen (if it detects motion).

#### **Updating Office Hours**

Update your office hours so the phone will know when you are in the office. Your office hours determine when the phone applies certain timeouts and when the camera should be most sensitive at detecting your presence. When you update your office hours, you specify when you start, and how long you work each day.

#### To update your office hours:

1. Tap Settings > Basic > Power Saving > Office Hours > Start Hour.

The Start Hour screen displays.



**2.** Tap the day(s) of the week you want to update, and then enter your start time(s).

Enter a start time using the 24-hour clock. You can enter a start time from 0 to 23. The default start time is 8.

**3.** Tap the **Save** soft key.

#### 4. Tap Duration.

The Duration screen displays.

**5.** Tap the day(s) of the week you want to update, and then enter the number of hours you work for a particular day.

You can enter a duration of 0 to 12 hours per day. The default duration is 10 hours per day (for Monday to Friday) and 0 hours per day (for Saturday and Sunday).

**6.** Tap the **Save** soft key.

#### **Updating Timeouts**

You can update the period of time the phone will be idle before the touch screen turns off (if the camera doesn't detect motion). You can specify different timeouts for office hours (Office Hours Idle Timeout) and non-office hours (Off Hours Idle Timeout). By default, the Office Hours Idle Timeout is much longer than the Off Hours Idle Timeout.

You can also specify a separate timeout period that applies after you press a key or soft key on the phone (User Input Idle Timeout). You may choose to set a higher User Input Idle Timeout (than the Office Hours and Off Hours Idle Timeouts) so that when you are actively using the phone, power-saving mode won't initiate as often.

**Note** If you press a key or tap a soft key (user input) on your phone, the idle timeout period that applies (User Input Idle Timeout or Office Hours/Off Hours Idle Timeout) will be the timeout with the highest value.

#### To update timeouts:



The Timeouts screen displays.



**2.** For the **Office Hours Idle Timeout** field, enter the number of minutes the phone should wait after being idle (during office hours) before starting power-saving mode.

You can enter a number between 1 minute and 600 minutes. The default is 10 minutes.

**3.** Tap **Off Hours Idle Timeout**, and then enter the number of minutes the phone should wait after being idle (during off-hours) before starting power-saving mode.

You can enter a number between 1 minute and 10 minutes. The default is 1 minute.

**4.** Tap **User Input Idle Timeout**, and then enter the number of minutes the phone should wait after being idle after a key press (during office hours or off-hours) before starting power-saving mode.

You can enter a number between 1 minute and 10 minutes. The default is 10 minutes.

**5.** Tap the **Save** soft key.

#### Updating User Detection Settings

You can specify how sensitive the camera should be at detecting motion. If the camera detects motion (for example, if you are near the phone), your phone will not initiate power-saving mode, even if an idle timeout has been reached.

If the camera detects motion, power-saving mode will terminate and the idle screen will display. If the camera sensitivity is high (five or higher), the phone will display the idle screen when you are near the phone. If the camera sensitivity is low (between one and four), you will have to wave your hand at the camera for the idle screen to display. By default, camera sensitivity is set higher during office hours. If you want, you can disable the user detection feature altogether.

**Note** The camera will detect any source of motion in front of it, not just a person or people nearby. For example, the camera will detect flying objects or rapidly-changing light conditions. Therefore, even if you are away from the phone, your phone may detect other sources of motion, and won't initiate power-saving mode.

In addition, since your phone's camera detects motion, if you close the camera shutter, point the camera at the ceiling, or set the camera sensitivity to 0, the phone will not detect your presence (even if you are nearby).

#### To update user detection settings:

**1.** Tap **Settings > Basic > Power Saving > User Detection**.

The User Detection screen displays.



**2.** For the **Office Hours Sensitivity** field, enter how sensitive you want the camera to be while you are in your office.

You can enter a number between 0 (no sensitivity) and 10 (high sensitivity). The default sensitivity is 7.

If you set a sensitivity between 1 and 4, you will have to wave your hand at the camera to exit power-saving mode. As well, power-saving mode may be initiated when you are in your office, but not close to your phone. (If you enter 0, the user detection feature is disabled and you will have to press a key on your phone to exit power-saving mode.)

**3.** Tap **Off Hours Sensitivity**, and then enter how sensitive you want the camera to be while you are not in the office.

You can enter a number between 0 (no sensitivity) and 10 (high sensitivity). The default sensitivity is 2.

If you set a sensitivity between 1 and 4, you will have to wave your hand at the camera to exit power-saving mode. As well, power-saving mode may be initiated when you are in your office, but not close to your phone. (If you enter 0, the user detection feature is disabled and you will have to press a key on your phone to exit power-saving mode.)

**4.** Tap the **Save** soft key.

## Muting the Microphone

During a call (including a conference call), press

button glows red, and 🧾 displays next to near-site video. The other party (or parties) cannot hear you.

Microphone Mute applies to all modes: Handset, Headset, and Speakerphone. You can still hear all other parties while mute is enabled.

To turn off Microphone Mute, press 🛛 🛛 🎍 🔹 again. The red light

behind the Mute button turns off, and 💋 no longer displays next to near-site video.

# Adjusting the Volume

Note

To adjust the speaker volume:
>> During a call, press either () or ().
To adjust the ringer volume:
>> When the phone is in the idle state, press either () or ().
To conform to regulatory requirements, handset and headset volume will return to a preset level after each call, but your system administrator can change this. Speakerphone volume settings will be maintained across calls.

# **Using Call Lists**

Your phone maintains lists of missed, received and placed calls. Each list can hold up to 100 entries.

If you miss one or more calls, the status bar will display an icon,

a counter indicating the number of new missed calls you have. To view information about the missed call(s), tap the icon on the touch screen, or navigate (see Viewing Call Lists on page 2-42), to your Missed Calls list. After you view the missed calls, the icon on the touch screen disappears.

The following figure shows the missed calls icon on the touch screen.

## **Viewing Call Lists**

You can access any call list from the Call Lists menu, or you can quickly access missed calls from the idle screen.

#### To view a call list:

- >> Do one of the following:
- Tap Features > Call Lists > Missed Calls, Received Calls, or Placed Calls.

or

- From the idle screen, use these shortcuts:
  - To view the received calls list, press the **Left** arrow key.
  - To view the missed calls list, press the Down arrow key. Or, if you
    haven't viewed a recently-missed call yet, tap the missed call icon,



- To view the placed calls list, press the **Right** arrow key.

### Managing Call Lists

You can clear all the records in a call list, or just one record. You can also choose a record in a list and return the call, store the call details in your local Contact Directory, or view detailed information about the particular call.

- To remove the call from the list, tap the **Clear** soft key.

- To store the contact in your local Contact Directory, tap the Save soft key.
- To view information about the call, such as the phone number, the time and duration of the call, and the name of the caller, tap the **Information** soft key.
- **3.** Tap for the idle screen.

## **Managing Contacts**

You can store a large number of contacts in your phone's local Contact Directory. Contact your system administrator for the exact number.

You can dial and search for contacts in this directory. You may be able to add, edit, and delete contacts. Contact your system administrator to see if you have read-only access to your local Contact Directory, or if you can update it.

If your system administrator sets up Corporate Directory on your phone, you may have read-only access to portions of your Corporate Directory. Your system administrator determines which contacts you can see. You can search for contacts in the Corporate Directory, and add contacts from the Corporate Directory to your local Contact Directory. For more information, see Searching for Contacts in a Corporate Directory on page 2-54 and Adding Contacts to Your Contact Directory from a Corporate Directory on page 2-51.

Note

You cannot update the contacts in your Corporate Directory. You can only search for and dial contacts, and add contacts from your Corporate Directory to your local Contact Directory.

Your phone may not display all the following fields (for example, the Watch Buddy and Block Buddy fields). For more information, see your system administrator.

You can enter a maximum of 32 characters.

 (Optional.) Tap the Last Name field, and then enter the last name of the contact (see Entering Data and Editing Fields on page 1-27.)

You can enter a maximum of 32 characters.

 (Required.) Tap the Contact field, and then enter the contact's phone number.

You can enter a maximum of 32 characters. The phone number must be unique, and must not already exist in the directory. If you save an entry with a non-unique phone number, the entry will not be saved.

 (Optional.) Tap the Speed Dial Index field, and then update the speed dial index number.

The speed dial index number is automatically assigned to the next available index value. If you want, you can change the speed dial index value. The speed dial index value can be any value between the next available number and a maximum value of 9999. If you assign a speed dial index number that is already taken, the message "Speed dial index already exists" displays.

Contacts with a speed dial index number can be automatically assigned to a Speed Dial Key for one-touch dialing. For more information, see Managing Speed Dial Keys on page 3-38.

(Optional.) Tap the Label field, and then enter a label for the contact.
 You can enter a maximum of 32 symbols, letters, or numbers.

If you specify a label, the label will be the first item that displays for the contact in the Contact Directory and on the Speed Dial Information screen (before the contact's first and last names, if specified). The label will also display on the contact's Speed Dial Key.

In the following figure, the label "Manager" has been assigned to Lauren Gates. As a result, Lauren Gates' Speed Dial Key displays "Manager" instead of "Lauren Gates."



 (Optional.) Tap the **Ring Type** field, and then enter the number that corresponds to the ring type you want to use for the contact.

To find the number associated with a ring type, see Updating the Ring Tone on page 2-20.

 (Optional.) Tap the Divert Contact field, and then enter the phone number of the third party to which you want this contact's calls sent.

You can enter a maximum of 32 characters.

(Optional.) Tap the **Auto Reject** field, and then tap the field's highlighted grey box. From the drop-down list, tap **Enabled** or **Disabled**. (The default setting is **Disabled**.) If you set the Auto Reject field to enabled, each time the contact calls, the call will be directed to your voice and video mail system (if one is set up). If you do not have a voice and video mail system set up, enabling the Auto Reject Note field will have no effect. Each time the contact calls, your phone will ring (unless you choose to divert the contact's calls, or enable call forwarding or Do Not Disturb on your phone). (Optional.) Tap the Auto Divert field, and then tap the field's highlighted grey box. From the drop-down list, tap **Enabled** or Disabled. (The default setting is Disabled.) If you set the Auto Divert field to enabled, each time the contact calls, the call will be directed to the third party you specified in the Divert Contact field. (Optional.) Tap the Watch Buddy field, and then tap the field's highlighted grey box. From the drop-down list, tap Enabled or **Disabled**. (The default setting is **Disabled**.) If you set the Watch Buddy field to enabled, you can monitor the contact's status. For more information on monitoring status, see Using Buddy Lists on page 4-6. (Optional.) Tap the Block Buddy field, and then tap the field's highlighted grey box. From the drop-down list, tap Enabled or **Disabled**. (The default setting is **Disabled**.) ## System Customizations

The following section details how your system administrator can customize your phone. For more information on the following customizations, see your system administrator.

### **Supporting Multiple Lines**

Your phone can support up to six different lines. Lines are assigned to the Line Keys on your phone. Typically, the top-most Line Key is reserved for the principal directory number (DN) of the phone.

When the phone is idle, Line Keys can display the following icons. (For information on icons that display when the phone has a call, see Phone Icons on page 1-22.)

<b>N</b>	Registered, shared lines. For more information, see Supporting Shared Lines on page 2-69.

DND	Lines that have Do Not Disturb enabled (see Enabling Do Not Disturb on page 3-33).

Your phone can handle a maximum of 24 calls, distributed across all lines. If your phone has two lines, and one line has 24 calls, your phone cannot accept any other calls.

You can set up any available key (that is, one that is not assigned to a line) as

a Speed Dial Key. Speed Dial Keys display



The following figure shows a phone set up with one phone line (1952). Since one Line Key is taken, there are five keys available that you can assign as Speed Dial Keys. In this example, five Speed Dial Keys are set up.



The following figure shows a phone set up with six different phone lines (1952, 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956, and 1957). In this case, there are no available keys that you can assign as Speed Dial Keys.



## Supporting Multiple Line Keys Per Line

Your system administrator can assign each phone line to a single Line Key, or to multiple Line Keys.

Incoming and outgoing calls for a phone line will be distributed evenly across all Line Keys that are assigned to the phone line. For example, if you have two Line Keys set up for DN 1952, and you have an active call for 1952 on the first Line Key, an incoming call for 1952 will go to the second Line Key.

The following figure shows a phone that is set up with one phone line (DN 1952) that is assigned to three Line Keys. In this case, incoming and outgoing calls for line 1952 will be distributed evenly among the three Line Keys. There are three available keys that are set up as Speed Dial Keys.



Your phone can be set up to have a combination of lines with a single Line Key and lines with multiple Line Keys.
The following figure shows a phone set up with two lines (1952 and 1953) that are each assigned to a Line Key, and a third line (1954) assigned to three Line Keys. There is one available key that is set up as a Speed Dial Key.

## **Supporting Shared Lines**

Note	Shared lines is an optional feature and may not be supported on your particular system. For more information, contact your system administrator.
Note	Call Forwarding is not available on shared lines.
	Do Not Disturb (DND) on shared lines disables the ringing option only. You will still see a visual notification.
	Your system administrator can set up your phone to support shared lines. If two phones share a line, an incoming call to that number will cause both phones to ring. The call can be answered on either phone, but not on both.
	Calls on shared lines can be transferred, put on hold, or added to a conference

## **Handling Calls**

At any time, at most one active call may be in progress on your phone. The active call is the one that has audio or video associated with it. There may be multiple other calls on hold, or in an "Incoming call" or "Ringing" state.

Your phone can handle a maximum of 24 concurrent calls. At most, your phone can handle one active call with 23 calls on hold, or 24 calls on hold.

Your phone displays all active incoming and outgoing calls in a large window in the center of the screen. Inactive calls (calls on hold, or incoming calls that you don't immediately answer) for a particular Line Key display in a row above the soft keys (the "inactive call group").

The following figure shows one active and four calls on hold for Line Key 1952.



To select a call on hold, tap the call on hold. New soft keys will display that apply to the selected call. If there are more than three calls on hold, tap



r < to view and select the additional calls on hold. You can also

press the **Right** arrow key or the **Left** arrow key to view and select a call on hold.

The touch screen only displays calls for one Line Key at one time. The calls that currently display on the touch screen are associated with the Line Key that is green.

To display and access the calls on another Line Key, tap that Line Key. When you tap a Line Key, the first call on hold in the inactive call group for that Line Key will automatically resume. The number of calls associated with a Line Key is indicated by a counter,



A Line Key will either be green or blue:

- Green Indicates that the Line Key has an active call or an incoming call. A green Line Key is associated with the calls that currently display on the touch screen (active or inactive).
- Blue Indicates that the Line Key doesn't have an active call, or has an incoming call that has been minimized and placed in the inactive call group. The calls associated with a blue Line Key do not currently display on the touch screen.

Line Keys also have a status indicator (a vertical bar on the far-right of the

Line Key),

1952 . The status indicator can be:

- Solid green A dial-tone is available, dialing is in progress, or a call is active.
- Flashing green An incoming call.
- Solid red A remote shared line is active.
- Flashing red A call (one or more) is on hold.

## Handling Video Calls

Note

Your phone can exchange video with a video endpoint other than a Polycom VVX 1500 phone. For a list of compatible endpoints, see your system administrator.

Your phone displays video in two windows: a small picture-in-picture (PIP) window located on the top-right of the screen, and a larger window centered in the middle of the touch screen. By default, the near site displays in the PIP, and the far site displays in the window in the center of the touch screen. Information about the call, such as the phone number of the party with whom you are talking and the duration of the call, appears next to the far site when it is displayed in the window in the center of the touch screen.



The following figure shows the near site in the PIP, and the far site, together with call information, in the larger window in the center of the touch screen.

You can tap the PIP to swap the windows the sites display in. When the near site displays in the window in the center of the touch screen, "Local camera" displays next to it.

The following figure shows the near site in the window in the center of the touch screen and the far site in the PIP.



During a video call, you can tap the **Video** soft key or press

display soft keys that allow you to access video features. The Video soft key is

only available when a video call is active. If you press

during an

to

audio-only call, the video soft keys will not display.

During a video call, you can tap the Video soft key to display the following video soft keys:

• Stop Video/Start Video-Starts and stops the transmission of near-site video. When you tap the **Stop Video** soft key, the far-site will no longer see you.

When you tap the **Stop Video** soft key, the stop video icon, *(isplays)*, displays next to the near site, in either the PIP or in the larger window in the center of the touch screen.

Note If you want, you can disable video across all calls, not just for the current call. For information on disabling video for all calls, see Disabling and Stopping Video on page 2-23.

You cannot start and stop far-site video. When your phone receives far-site video, your phone will always display the far site.

Full Screen – Displays the video that is in the center of the screen on the full screen. The PIP still displays in the corner, but the soft keys are hidden. (Depending on the video endpoint, you may or may not see the black bars.)



To display the site in the center of the touch screen and to access soft keys again, tap the touch screen outside of the PIP. (If you tap the PIP, you will just swap the windows the sites display in.)

Note You don't have to access the video soft keys to display video on the full screen. During a video call, tap the window in the center of the touch screen to display the site on the full screen. To display the site in the center of the touch screen again, tap the touch screen outside of the PIP. (If you tap the PIP, you will just swap the windows the sites display in.)

• Swap – Switches the windows the sites display in. For example, the site in the PIP will display in the window in the center of the touch screen, and the site in the window in the center of the touch screen will display in the PIP.

Note You don't have to access the video soft keys to swap the windows the sites display in. During a video call, tap the PIP to swap the windows the sites display in. To swap windows again, tap the PIP again.

If you want, you can set up your phone to automatically display the far site on the full screen. For more information, see Updating Video Settings on page 2-24.

• Back – Displays the call soft keys again (Hold, End Call, Transfer, and Conference).

For more information on using video and updating video settings, see Updating Video Settings on page 2-24.

## **Placing Calls**

You can place a call in various ways using your phone:

- Using the handset
- Using the speakerphone
- Using the headset

You can dial the number first, and then choose the method to speak to the other party (handset, speakerphone, or headset), or choose the method first, and then dial the number. You can also place a call using a URL or IP address.

During a call, you can alternate between handset, headset, or speakerphone

modes by picking up the handset, or pressing  $\begin{bmatrix} \mathbf{O} \\ HEADSET \end{bmatrix}$  or  $\begin{bmatrix} \mathbf{O} \\ SP \ PHONE \end{bmatrix}$ . For example, if you are using the handset, you can switch to headset mode by pressing  $\begin{bmatrix} \mathbf{O} \\ HEADSET \end{bmatrix}$ , or switch to speakerphone mode by pressing  $\begin{bmatrix} \mathbf{O} \\ SP \ PHONE \end{bmatrix}$ .

Your phone monitors the duration of all calls through a local call timer. You can view the call timer for the active call and for calls on hold.

In the figure below, the active call to Jack Jones has lasted for 21 minutes, 19 seconds. The calls to James and Jacklyn have lasted for 41 minutes, 21 seconds and 41 minutes, 39 seconds respectively.



Note

Instead of entering a phone number from memory, you can access call lists, directories, and speed dial lists to display and dial numbers for you. You can also redial numbers. For more information, see Using Call Lists on page 2-41, Managing Contacts on page 2-44, Placing Calls Using Speed Dial on page 3-10, and Redialing Numbers on page 3-15.

## **Answering Calls**

When you are not in another call, you can answer a call in three ways:

- Using the handset
- Using the speakerphone
- Using the headset

Note	Your phone distributes incoming calls for lines that have multiple Line Keys evenly across all Line Keys.
Note	If you don't want to answer a call, or you want to delay answering a call, do the following:
	• To remove the incoming call window in the center of the touch screen, minimize it, and place it in the inactive call group (so you can still answer it, if you want), tap the <b>Ignore</b> soft key.
	• To remove the incoming call window and the opportunity to answer the call, tap the <b>Reject</b> soft key (for private lines), the <b>Silence</b> soft key (for shared lines) or press the <b>DND</b> key (Do Not Disturb) when your phone rings. The Do Not Disturb mode stays active until you press the <b>DND</b> key again.
	• To forward incoming calls to another phone, tap the <b>Forward</b> soft key (see Forwarding Calls Dynamically on page 3-33). (If your phone is set up with shared lines, there is no <b>Forward</b> soft key.)
Note	If you set up your phone with a silent ring, tap the Line Key with the status indicator that is flashing green, or tap the <b>Answer</b> soft key, to answer the call. If your handset is off-hook, the call is routed to the handset. If your handset is on-hook, the call is routed to the speaker.

#### Answering When Not in Another Call

In all cases, the active call will appear on the screen and display the call duration and who the call is from.

The following figure shows an active video call.



To answer a call using the handset:

>> Pick up the handset.

#### To answer a call using the speakerphone:

If your speakerphone does not work, your system administrator may have disabled the speakerphone on your phone. Handle calls using a handset or headset instead. If your system administrator disables the speakerphone on your phone, "Handsfree mode disabled" appears on the touch screen after you press the **SP PHONE** key.

- >> With the handset on-hook, do one of the following:
  - Tap the incoming call window that displays in the middle of the touch screen.

(After 10 seconds, the incoming call is placed in the inactive call group, and you have to tap the **Answer** soft key to answer it.)

- Tap the Line Key with the status indicator that is flashing green.
- Press (I) SP PHONE

 If Headset Memory Mode is activated, tap the Line Key with the status indicator that is flashing green, or tap the **Answer** soft key.

#### Answering When in Another Call

If you have an active call and an incoming call arrives (on the same or a different Line Key), the following happens:

• A call waiting tone beeps.

**Note** A "beep" is the default call waiting tone. Your system administrator can change the tone to another sound, or make it silent.

- The status indicator on the Line Key indicator associated with the incoming call flashes green.
- The call counter for the Line Key associated with the incoming call increments by one (showing the number of calls associated with the Line Key, including the incoming call).
- Caller information for the incoming call displays in a window in the center of the touch screen, and the Line Key associated with the incoming call glows green. After a certain length of time, the window is minimized and placed in the inactive call group, and the Line Key associated with the call glows blue (if there is an active call on another Line Key).

#### To answer an incoming call when you are in another call:

>> Tap the Line Key with the status indicator that is flashing green, or tap the **Answer** soft key. The original call is automatically placed on hold, and the incoming call becomes the active call.

**Note** If you wait too long, the incoming call window is minimized and placed in the inactive call group (along the bottom of the touch screen), and the active call reappears in the window in the center of the touch screen. To answer the incoming call, tap the Line Key with the status indicator that is flashing green, or tap the **Hold** soft key to place the active call on hold, and then tap the **Answer** soft key.

#### To answer an incoming call on a shared line:

- **1.** Tap the Line Key with the status indicator that is flashing green, or tap the **Answer** soft key.
- **2.** Tap the **Hold** soft key or press

Note If you wait too long, the incoming call window is minimized and placed in the inactive call group (along the bottom of the touch screen), and the active call reappears in the window in the center of the touch screen. To answer the incoming call, tap the Line Key with the status indicator that is flashing green, or tap the Hold soft key to place the active call on hold, and then tap the Answer soft key.

Anyone on another phone configured to use the same shared line may take the call by tapping the Line Key associated with the held call (represented by a flashing red status indicator).

## **Ending Calls**

#### To end a call:

>> Do one of the following:

- Tap the End Call soft key.
- If you are in handset mode, replace the handset.
- If you are in speakerphone mode, press
- If you are in headset mode, press
   Q
   HEADSET

## **Redialing Numbers**

Redial a number by pressing  $\bigcirc_{\text{REDIAL}}$ , or accessing your placed calls list.

#### To redial the last call placed from your phone:

>> Press OREDIAL

A call to your last placed call is attempted.

#### To redial a previously placed call:

**1.** Do one of the following:

or

- From the idle screen, press the **Right** arrow key.

The Placed Calls list displays.



2. Tap the call you want to dial, and then tap the Dial soft key.

Note

You can also place a call from the Missed Calls and Received Calls lists. To access the Missed Calls list, press the **Down** arrow key. To access the Received Calls list, press the **Left** arrow key.

## **Placing Calls on Hold**

To place a call on hold, tap the **Hold** soft key or press during an active call. When you place a call on hold, the following happens:

- The hold icon, 🕵, will display on the Line Key.
- The Line Key status indicator will flash red.
- The call's window is minimized and placed in the inactive call group (above the soft keys). The inactive call window displays "Hold."

**Note** The Hold feature typically generates music or a beeping tone. Therefore, avoid placing a conference call on hold.

#### **Multiple Calls on Hold**

Your phone displays all calls for a Line Key by displaying multiple windows on the screen. The phone only displays the calls for one Line Key at a time.

The active call (if any) displays in a window in the center of the touch screen. Held calls or incoming calls display in minimized windows above the phone's soft keys (the "inactive call group"). The Line Key associated with the displayed calls is green. The Line Key displays a counter showing the number of calls for the Line Key. If all the calls for a Line Key are inactive, the status indicator for the Line Key glows red. If the Line Key has an active call, the status indicator glows green.



The following figure shows one active call and four calls on hold for Line Key 1952.

To select a call on hold, tap the call on hold. New soft keys will display that apply to the selected call. To resume the call, tap the **Resume** soft key or press





additional calls on hold. You can also press the **Right** arrow key or the **Left** arrow key to select a call on hold.

To access the calls on another Line Key, tap that Line Key. When you tap a Line Key, the first call on hold in the inactive call group for that Line Key will automatically resume.

## **Hosting Conference Calls**

You can create a conference with two other parties using the phone's local conference feature. During a conference call, your phone can exchange video with only one conference participant (even if more than one participant can send video). The participant with whom you exchange video depends on how you set up the conference. You also have the option of choosing the participant with whom to exchange video (see Managing Conference Call Participants on page 3-22).

During a conference, you have access to the conference management feature. This feature allows you to manage each participant in the conference call. You can mute, hold, and remove individual participants, as well as choose the conference participant with whom to exchange video. For more information, see Managing Conference Call Participants on page 3-22.

- 4. When the second party answers, tap the **Conference** soft key or press



again to join all parties in the conference.

Note

If configured for single key-press conferences, you do not need to tap the Conference soft key again.

If the second participant can exchange video, you will exchange video with the second participant. If the second participant cannot exchange video, but the first participant can, you will exchange video with the first participant.



The Conference window displays.

#### To set up a conference call with an active call and a call on hold:

**Note** You can only set up a conference with an active call and a call on hold if you only have one call on hold. If you have more than one call on hold, you have to set up a conference using the Conference key or soft key.

>> If you have an active call and a call on hold (either on the same Line Key or a different Line Key), tap the **Join** soft key.



The Conference screen displays.

A conference is created with the active call, the call on hold, and yourself. The conference call takes place on the Line Key from which you handled the last active call.

If the participant who was previously on hold can exchange video, you will exchange video with that participant. If the participant who was on hold cannot exchange video, you will exchange video with the other participant.

### Holding and Resuming Conference Calls

When you place a conference call on hold, you place all other conference participants on hold.

To place a specific participant on hold, see Managing Conference Call Participants on page 3-22.

#### To place a conference call on hold:

>> During a conference call, tap the **Hold** soft key.

The other parties in the conference call are placed on hold. The Conference window is minimized and placed in the inactive call group.

To resume the conference call, tap the **Resume** soft key. To end the conference call and place all other conference call participants on hold, tap the **Split** soft key.

### **Ending Conference Calls**

You can end a conference, and your connection to the other parties, by tapping the End Call soft key. When you tap the End Call soft key, the other participants remain connected.

#### To end a conference call:

>> During a conference call, tap the **End Call** soft key.

The other parties remain connected.

### Splitting Conference Calls into Two Calls on Hold

When a conference is established, a Split soft key is available. When you split a conference, you end the conference and place all parties on hold. The Split soft key is available during conference calls, and when a conference call is on hold.

#### To split a conference call:

>> During a conference call, tap the **Split** soft key. (If a conference call is on hold, tap the conference call window, and then tap the **Split** soft key.)

The conference ends, and all calls are split into individual calls and put on hold.

### Managing Conference Call Participants

When you manage conference call participants, you can do the following:

- Mute a participant.
- Place a participant on hold.
- Remove a participant from the conference.
- Obtain information about a participant.
- Choose the participant with whom to exchange video.

To manage a participant, tap the window of the participant you want to manage. The soft keys update to show Far Mute, Hold, Remove, Information, and Back.

The following figure shows the soft keys that display when you manage a conference call participant. If the participant you tapped is not the participant with whom you are exchanging video, the Select Video soft key also displays.



#### To manage a conference call:

**1.** During a conference call, tap the window of the conference call participant you want to manage.

The soft keys update so you can manage the participant.

You can access the following soft keys:

- Far Mute Mutes the selected participant. The muted participant can hear all participants, but no participant can hear the muted participant.
- Select Video Selects the conference call participant as the "active" conference participant. This is the participant with whom you will exchange video.

(The Select Video soft key does not display if you are currently exchanging video with the selected participant, or if the participant is not calling from a video endpoint.)

- Hold Places a selected participant on hold. The held participant cannot hear any parties and no participant can hear the held participant.
- Remove Removes the selected participant from the conference, ends the conference call, and creates an active call between you and the other participant.
- Info Provides additional information about the selected participant.
- Back Displays the conference call soft keys again (Hold, End Call, Manage, Split, Video).
- **2.** Do one of the following:
  - To mute a participant, tap the participant, and then tap the Far Mute soft key.

The muted participant can hear all participants, but no participant can hear the muted participant. The far mute icon, *M*, displays in the participant's window.

(If you press **a** instead of tapping the **Far Mute** soft

key, all other participants can hear each other, but they cannot hear

you. The red mute icon, 💋 , displays next to near-site video.)

To un-mute the party, tap the **UnMute** soft key.

- To select a party as the "active" conference participant (the participant with whom you will exchange video), tap the participant, and then tap the **Select Video** soft key.
- To place a participant on hold, tap the participant, and then tap the Hold soft key.

The held participant cannot hear any participants and no participant can hear the held participant.

To return the participant to the conference, tap the **Resume** soft key.

(If the held participant taps the Hold soft key or presses

their phone, the participant will still be held within the conference even if you tap the **Resume** soft key.)

To place a conference call on hold, see Holding and Resuming Conference Calls on page 3-21.

- To remove a participant from the conference, tap the **Remove** soft key.

### Handling Video During Conference Calls

During a conference call that includes a video endpoint, you can tap the **Video** soft key (if you aren't managing a conference participant) or press

to display soft keys that allow you to start and stop near-site video,

## **Transferring Calls**

A call can be transferred in one of three ways:

- Consultative transfer The party to whom you want to transfer the call answers their phone before you transfer the call or hang up. You can consult with them before completing the transfer. You also have the option of transferring the call before the party answers.
  - Performing a Consultative Transfer on page 3-25.
- Blind transfer The call is automatically transferred after you dial the number of the party to whom you want to transfer the call. You do not have the option of talking to the party.
  - Performing a Blind Transfer on page 3-27.
- Attended transfer Conference call parties are automatically connected to each other after you exit a conference.
  - Set up a conference call and then end your participation. For more information, see Ending Conference Calls on page 3-22.

#### Performing a Consultative Transfer

Perform a consultative transfer if you want to talk to the party to whom you are transferring the call. Or, you can choose not to talk to the party. In this case, you wait for the party's ring-back sound, and then transfer the call.

#### To transfer a call:

**1.** During a call, tap the **Transfer** soft key or press **C**. The active call is placed on hold.

The Transfer to: screen displays.



- **2.** Place a call to the party to whom you want to transfer the call. See Placing Calls on page 3-6.
- 3. When you hear the ring-back sound, tap the Transfer soft key or press

TRANSFER . If you want to talk privately to the person to whom you are

transferring the call before the transfer is complete, wait until the person answers the call, talk to the person, and then tap the **Transfer** soft key or



If you are using a handset, the transfer can be completed by putting the handset on the cradle.

You can cancel the transfer before the call connects by tapping the **Cancel** soft key.

#### Performing a Blind Transfer

When you use a blind transfer, you transfer a call without speaking to the party to whom you are transferring the call. The call is automatically transferred as soon as you dial the party's number.

#### To perform a blind transfer:

**1.** During a call, tap the **Transfer** soft key or press

TRANSFER

The Transfer to: screen displays, with the Blind soft key.



**2.** Tap the **Blind** soft key.

The Blind transfer to: screen displays.



**3.** Place a call to the party to whom you want to transfer the call. See Placing Calls on page 3-6.

(If you want to cancel the transfer [before the call is placed], and return to the original call, press the **Cancel** soft key.)

The call automatically transfers to the party you specified.

## **Forwarding Calls**

Note

Your company's settings may override this feature. For more information, contact your system administrator.

Call forwarding is not available on shared lines.

You can set up your phone to forward incoming calls to another party (static forwarding) or you can forward a call as your phone rings (dynamic forwarding). Your phone will forward calls even if you enable the Do Not Disturb feature. You can also reject calls from a particular contact (by sending the call to your voice and video mail system), or divert calls from a particular contact to another party. For more information, see Managing Incoming Calls on page 2-61.

### Forwarding Calls Statically

You can set up your phone to forward all calls to another number.

#### To forward all incoming calls to another party:

**1.** Do one of the following:

### Forwarding Calls Dynamically

You can manually forward a call to another number while your phone rings.

#### To forward an incoming call to another party:

- **1.** While your phone rings, tap the **Forward** soft key.
- **2.** Enter the phone number to forward the incoming call to.

Your phone displays the last number you forwarded calls to (either statically or dynamically).

**3.** Tap the **Forward** soft key.

The incoming call is forwarded to the other party. If call forwarding is disabled, all future calls will not be forwarded and forwarding will remain disabled.

## **Enabling Do Not Disturb**

Do Not Disturb is an optional feature that your system administrator sets up. Your system may not support it. For more information, contact your system administrator.

When a new entry is added to the Contact Directory, it is automatically assigned a speed dial index number, as well as the next available position under the Line Key(s). The phone populates all available positions with the contacts that have the lowest speed dial index numbers.

Speed Dial Keys display consecutively according to the speed dial index number (the lowest speed dial index number displays first). To re-order Speed Dial Keys, see Updating Speed Dial Keys on page 3-40.

For information on assigning or updating speed dial index numbers, see Updating Contacts in Your Local Contact Directory on page 2-56. For information on placing calls using speed dials, see Placing Calls Using Speed Dial on page 3-10.

## **Adding Speed Dial Keys**

Each time you add a contact to your Contact Directory, a speed dial index number is automatically assigned to the contact. If a position is available under the Line Key(s), the contact is automatically assigned to it, and you can place a call to the contact by tapping the Speed Dial Key.

#### To assign a new Speed Dial Key:

- **1.** Tap **Features > Contact Directory**.
- **2.** Tap the **Add** soft key.
- **3.** Add contact information for the new contact (see Adding Contacts to Your Local Contact Directory on page 2-47).

The speed dial index can be any value between the next available number and a maximum value of 9999.

If you assign a speed dial index number that is already taken, the message "Speed dial index already exists" displays.



Polycom recommends that you assign speed dial index values consecutively.

For example, if you assign the third position to the speed dial index value "2," assign the fourth position to the speed dial index value "3."

- **4.** Tap the **Save** soft key.
- **5.** Tap to return to the idle screen.

## **Updating Speed Dial Keys**

Update a Speed Dial Key to remove or re-order the Speed Dial Keys on your phone. You update a Speed Dial Key by updating a contact's speed dial index number. Voice and video mail is an optional feature that your system administrator sets up. Your system may not support it. For more information, contact your system administrator.

Screen options may vary with your application. Voice/video mail may be accessible with a single key press. Contact your system administrator about this option.

You can access voice and video mail messages from your phone. Your mail is saved in a centralized location.

Your phone may indicate mail by the following:

• An icon, , on the status bar. The icon has a counter indicating the number of unviewed messages you have.

An icon, 🔀 , next to the Line Key.

- An audible alert (if your phone is on-hook).

#### To access voice or video messages:



Message Center. Or, press  $\left( \bigotimes_{MSG} \right)$ , and then tap Message Center.

The Messages screen displays.

(If multiple lines are set up on your phone, the Line Select screen displays instead, and you have to tap the line for which to listen to messages. Then, the Messages screen displays.)

## **Using Instant Messaging**

Note

Instant messaging is an optional feature that your system administrator enables. Your system may not support it. For more information, contact your system administrator.

You can send and receive instant messages using your phone. Instant messaging is supported in real-time.

Your phone may indicate instant messages by the following:

- An icon, , on the status bar. The icon has a counter indicating the number of unviewed messages you have.
- An icon, X, next to the Line Key.
- A fast flashing LED indicator.
- An audible alert (if your phone is on-hook).

## **Reading and Managing Instant Messages**

Messages display in the order they are received (the first message received displays first).

### To read instant messages:

- **Note** Screen options may vary with your application. For more information, contact your system administrator.
  - **1.** Do one of the following :



The Instant Messages screen displays.

(If multiple lines are configured on your phone, the Line Select screen displays instead, and you have to select the line to retrieve messages from. Then, the Instant Messages screen displays.)



- **2.** From the Instant Messages screen, you can do the following:
  - Tap the Next or Previous soft key to view a specific message. The first message received displays first.
  - To create a new message, tap the New soft key (see Sending Instant Messages on page 4-3).
  - To reply to the message, tap the **Reply** soft key (see Sending Instant Messages on page 4-3, step 3).
  - To delete the message, tap the **Delete** soft key.
- **3.** Tap to return to the idle screen.

## Sending Instant Messages

When you send a message, you can either select a message from a preset list of short messages (for example, "Call me" and Can't chat now"), or you can use the dialpad to type a custom message.

Note

### To send an instant message:

Screen options may vary with your application. Instant messaging may be accessible with a single key press. Contact your system administrator about this option.

**1.** Do one of the following:



The Instant Messages screen displays.

(If multiple lines are configured on your phone, the Line Select screen displays instead, and you have to select the line to send the message from. Then, the Instant Messages screen displays.)



**2.** Tap the **New** soft key, enter the phone number, URL, or IP address to send the message to, and then tap the **Ok** soft key.

The phone number, URL, or IP address you entered displays on the screen.



- **3.** Do one of the following:
  - To choose a pre-scripted message, tap the Select soft key. From the Message Select screen, tap the message you want.
  - or
  - To compose a custom message, tap the Edit soft key, and then enter your message. (For information on entering data, see Entering Data and Editing Fields on page 1-27.)
- **4.** Tap the **Send** soft key.
- **5.** Tap **to return to the idle screen**.

## **Using Buddy Lists**

Note

Monitoring the status (presence) of contacts is an optional feature that your system administrator enables. Your system may not support it. For more information, contact your system administrator.

A buddy list is a list of users/devices whose status, or "presence," you can monitor. Users update their presence setting (for example, "Be right back," "Out to lunch," or "Busy"), and you can view their status in real time from your phone's Buddy Status screen, or from the idle screen (if your buddy has a Speed Dial Key on your phone). If you like, you can block others from monitoring your status.

Your phone can "watch" the status of up to eight other phones. These phones form your "Buddy List." Your phone can be monitored by up to eight other phones.

**Note** Depending on the types of phones you monitor, and how they are configured, you may be able to monitor up to 48 buddies.

If your phone is configured to work with Microsoft Office Live Communications Server 2005, the behavior of presence settings and buddy lists is different. For more information, see Integrating With Microsoft Live Communications Server 2005 on page 4-14, or contact your system administrator.

## **Updating Your Presence Settings**

Your presence setting indicates your status (either online, busy, be right back, away, out to lunch, offline, or do not disturb). Update your presence setting so that other users can monitor your status from their phones.

When you select a presence setting (other than online), the setting displays on the status bar on your phone.

#### To update your presence settings:

- **1.** Do one of the following:
  - Tap the My Status soft key.

or

Tap Features > Presence > My Status.

This affects information sent to phones watching you. Presence information will also be sent to watching phones when you go off-hook or enable Do Not Disturb.

**3.** Tap **to return to the idle screen**.

The status you selected displays on the status bar (unless you selected Online).

The following figure shows what the touch screen looks like when you assign a presence status (in this case, "Busy"). If you assign the status "Online" (the default status), the presence status does not display on the screen.

## **Managing Buddies**

Manage your buddies by selecting the contacts whose presence you want to monitor. These contacts form your buddy list. You add contacts to your buddy list from your local Contact Directory.

When you select a buddy, a Speed Dial Key is automatically assigned to the buddy (if one is available), and the Speed Dial Key will display the buddy's status. If the contact you choose as a buddy already has a Speed Dial Key, the contact's Speed Dial Key will display the buddy's status.

If your call server is Microsoft Live Communications Server 2005, see Integrating With Microsoft Live Communications Server 2005 on page 4-14.

## **Updating Your Buddy List**

Update your buddy list by updating the contacts in your local Contact Directory.

### To update your buddy list:



The Directory screen displays.



**2.** Tap the contact you want to monitor or stop monitoring, and then tap the **Edit** soft key.

**3.** Tap the **Watch Buddy** field, and then tap the field's highlighted grey box. From the drop-down list, tap **Enabled** or **Disabled**.

When Watch Buddy is enabled, the contact is added to your buddy list and you can monitor the contact's status.

When Watch Buddy is disabled, the contact is removed from your buddy list and you cannot monitor the contact's status.

The default for Watch Buddy is Disabled.

- **4.** Tap the **Save** soft key.
- **5.** Tap to return to the idle screen.

If you enable the Watch Buddy setting for a contact, the contact will display on your Buddy Status screen, and on the idle screen (if your buddy has a Speed Dial Key). To view your Buddy Status screen, tap the **Buddies** soft key from the idle screen.

### Blocking and Unblocking Contacts from Viewing Your Status

Block a contact in your Contact Directory if you don't want the contact to view your status. If you unblock a contact, the contact can add you to their buddy list and view your status.

Note

•

To view a list of contacts that can and cannot monitor your status, do the following:

- To view contacts that cannot view your status, press the **Menu** key, and then tap **Features > Presence > Blocked List**.
- To view contacts that can view your status, press the **Menu** key, and then tap **Features > Presence > Watcher List**.

To block or unblock a contact from viewing your status:

**1.** Tap **Features > Contact Directory**.

**3.** Tap **Block Buddy**, and then tap the field's highlighted grey box. From the drop-down list, tap **Enabled** or **Disabled**.

When Block Buddy is enabled, the contact cannot watch your status. The contact will display in your Blocked List.

When Block Buddy is disabled, the contact can watch your status. The contact will display in your Watcher List.

The default for Block Buddy is Disabled.

**4.** Tap the **Save** soft key.



Note

You can use your Blocked List to unblock a contact, rather than updating the Contact Directory. Press the **Menu** key, and then tap **Features > Presence > Blocked List**. From the Blocked List screen, tap the contact you want to unblock, and then tap the **Unblock** soft key. The contact can now watch your phone, and will display in your Watcher List.

## **Monitoring Buddies**

You can monitor the status of all the contacts in your buddy list from the idle screen (if your buddy has a Speed Dial Key), or from the Buddy Status list.

### Monitoring Buddies from the Idle Screen

Your phone automatically assigns a buddy to a Speed Dial Key (if one is available). The Speed Dial Key displays an icon and status indicator (a vertical bar on the far-right of the key) that indicate the buddy's status.

The following table shows the presence icons and status indicators that display on the Speed Dial Key to indicate a buddy's status.

Buddy Status	Speed Dial Key Icon	Status Indicator
Online		(No indicator)
Busy/Do Not Disturb	S	Solid red
Away/Be Right Back Out to Lunch	Å	Flashing red
Offline	8	Solid red

The following figure shows a phone that is monitoring two buddies: Lauren Gates and Jack Jones. Lauren Gates is Online, and Jack Jones is either Away, Out to Lunch, or Be Right Back.



#### Monitoring Buddies from the Buddy List

If you can't monitor all your buddies from the idle screen (because you have more buddies than available Speed Dial Keys), use the Buddy Status list.

#### To monitor a contact in your buddy list:

- >> Do one of the following:
  - Tap the **Buddies** soft key.

or

- Tap Features > Presence > Buddy Status.

The Buddy Status screen displays, listing the status of all your buddies.



## Integrating With Microsoft Live Communications Server 2005

Your system administrator can configure your phone to work with Microsoft Live Communications Server 2005 and communicate with others using Microsoft Office Communicator and Windows Messenger. From your phone, you can invite, join, control, and monitor integrated multipoint audio and video conferences. Any contact you add through your buddy list will appear as a contact in Microsoft Office Communicator and Windows Messenger. Any contact you add as a contact in Microsoft Office Communicator and Windows Messenger will appear in your buddy list. You can access your Privacy List on the phone to allow or disallow your contacts from monitoring your presence.

To view and change your presence, see Updating Your Presence Settings on page 4-6. For more information on integrating with Microsoft Live Communications Server 2005, contact your system administrator.

#### To add a contact to your buddy list:

- **1.** Tap **Features > Presence > Buddy Status**.
- 2. Tap the Add soft key.
- **3.** Enter the phone number of the contact.
- **4.** Tap the **Submit** soft key.
- **5.** Tap to return to the idle screen.

#### To view and change your privacy list:

- 1. Tap Features > Presence > Buddy Status > Privacy List.
- **2.** Tap the contact whose access you want to update.
- **3.** Tap the **Edit** soft key.
- **4.** Tap the **Access** field, and then tap the field's highlighted grey box. From the drop-down list, tap **Enabled** or **Disabled**.

When Access is enabled, you allow the contact to see your presence.

When Access is disabled, you prevent the contact from seeing your presence.

The default for Access is Disabled.



For more information, see the Microsoft Office Communicator and Windows Messenger documentation.

## Using the Busy Lamp Field

Note

Busy Lamp Field (BLF) is an optional feature that your system administrator sets up. Your system may not support it.

The BLF feature allows you to monitor a line on another phone so you can tell if the other line is idle or busy (has an active call). The lines you can monitor display under your phone's Line Key(s). The number of lines you can monitor is determined by the number of lines your phones has. For example, if your phone has one line assigned to one Line Key, then you can monitor up to five other lines.

The following table shows the BLF icons and status indicators that display when you monitor a line on another phone.

BLF Status	Line Key Icon	Status Indicator
ldle	<u> </u>	(No indicator)
Busy	8	Solid red

The following figure shows two remote lines. Line 1953 is idle and Line 4002 is busy.



## **Recording Calls and Conferences**

Note

Recording calls is an optional feature that your system may not support. For more information, contact your system administrator.

When you record a video call, your phone will only record the audio component.



For a list of supported USB devices to record phone audio, see Technical Bulletin 38084, *Supported USB Devices for SoundPoint IP 650/670 and Polycom VVX 1500 Phones*, at http://www.polycom.com/support/voice/soundpoint\_ip/VoIP\_Technical\_Bulletins\_pu b.html.

If the Call Recording and Playback feature is available, and you connect a USB device to the USB port on your phone, you can record active calls (audio component only) on your phone. Recordings are stored as **.wav** files on the USB device. You can record up to four hours in one file. The approximate time remaining for recording (the free space on the USB device) is shown on the status bar of the phone screen.

The following figure shows that you have 16.7 hours of free space on your USB device.



The **Record** soft key controls recording and is available:

- When there are one or more calls connected to your phone (you may need to tap the **More** soft key to see it)
- During an active call
- When calls are on hold
- During a consultative transfer or conference call

The **Record** soft key is not available:

- When there are no connected calls on your phone
- When you place a new call (to transfer or to conference)
- When the phone prompts you to answer an incoming call

If you put an active call on hold, recording pauses. Recording continues if the called party puts you on hold. Recording stops if all active calls end, no matter who ends the calls.

If you press	4	while recording,	only the	called	parties	are

recorded.

Tones and indications (for example, dialing of digits or ringing from another party's phone) that occur before a call connects are not recorded. Local tones and indications (for example, DTMF tones when dialing) are not recorded. However, tones from another party's phone may be recorded.

You control recording by tapping the Start, Pause, Resume, and Stop soft keys. All active calls that occur on your phone between the time you tap the Start soft key and the Stop soft key are recorded, alternating in the same **.wav** file.

For example, on October 4, 2007 at 11:22 am, you place a call to party A. After party A answers, you start recording the call. While you speak with party A, an incoming call arrives. You place party A on hold and speak with party B. When you finish speaking with party B, you return to speaking with party A. While speaking with party A again, another incoming call arrives. You place party A on hold and speak with party C. When you finish speaking with party A, and recording stops.

Your conversations with parties A, B, and C are all recorded in the same **.wav** file as follows:



If you record, or attempt to record, a call, the following messages may appear on your screen:

• If there is insufficient free space on the USB device when you tap the Start soft key, recording does not start and the following message displays:

"USB device is full. Recording cancelled."

• If the USB device becomes full during recording, recording stops and the following message displays:

"USB device is full. Recording stopped."

• If you remove the USB device during recording, recording stops and the following message displays:

"USB device removed unsafely. Recording cancelled."

• If you attach an unsupported USB device, the following message displays (along with information about the unsupported product):

"Unsupported USB device attached."



Polycom recommends that you do not remove the USB device while recording. The file being recorded will be incomplete and cannot be played back later. There is a small probability that the USB device itself may be damaged by this action.

Note

If you connect the USB device to your phone and the message "Unsupported USB device attached" displays, see your system administrator about the USB devices your phone supports.

Note

You may be required by federal, state, and/or local laws to notify some or all called parties when you record calls (either one-party or all-party consent). You can find specific information about US state requirements at http://www.rcfp.org/taping/. Telephone call recording regulations in other countries vary widely. Polycom recommends checking with the local government's telecommunications authority and government legal agencies.

To access the top-level soft keys (for example, Hold, End Call, Transfer, and Conference), tap the **Back** soft key. To access the Stop and Pause soft keys again, tap the Record soft key.

- **3.** To stop recording, do one of the following:
  - Tap the Stop soft key. Then, tap the Back soft key to access the top-level soft keys.
  - or
  - To end the call, tap the Back soft key, and then tap the End Call soft key.
  - or

- To end the call, hang up.

## **Recording Conferences**

You can record conference calls in the same way as other calls with the following exceptions:

• All parties in a conference call are recorded. If one of the conference parties

*y* , that party is not recorded.

• When a conference call is placed on hold, recording is paused. You can place or answer other calls, which will be recorded in the same file. When the conference call is resumed, recording of the conference resumes.

## Pausing and Resuming Recording

You can pause recording by tapping the Pause soft key. When you tap the Resume soft key, recording continues within the same **.wav** file.

### To pause a recording:

>> Tap the **Pause** soft key.

"\*P\*" displays on the status bar when you pause recording.



#### To resume a recording:

>> Tap the **Resume** soft key.

"\*R\*" displays on the status bar when you restart recording.



## **Playing Back Recorded Calls**

Note

Call Playback is an optional feature and may not be supported on your particular system. For more information, see your system administrator.

If the Call Recording and Playback feature is available, and a removable USB device is connected to your phone, you can play back calls that you recorded on your phone.

You can browse the recorded files, stored as **.wav** files, on the USB device. You can also open, rename, and delete the recorded files. If there are no supported **.wav** files on the USB device, the message "Unsupported wav file format" appears on the screen.

Playback occurs in real time. To adjust the volume of the receiver audio during

playback, press () or ()

Playback stops if you tap the **Back** soft key, or press the **Left** arrow key, (



If the handset is off-hook when you tap the **Play** soft key, you will hear audio through the handset. If the handset is on-hook when you tap the **Play** soft key, you will hear audio through the speaker. If you lift the handset while you listen through the speaker, you will hear the audio through the handset.

You cannot open a **.wav** file while a call is in progress or if you have placed a call. The message "Active call, action aborted" displays in either case. If all

calls are on hold, you can start playback. If you press

for the selected

call or the particular Line Key for the held call, playback stops and the call resumes.

You cannot place a call while playback is in progress using the dialpad. However, you can place a call using a speed dial key or Line Key. You can answer calls while playback is in progress (see Answering a Call While Playing Back Recorded Calls on page 4-29).

You can also play back recorded files on other devices, such as a Windows<sup>®</sup> or Apple<sup>®</sup> based computer using an application capable of playing **.wav** files.

If an error occurs while playback is in progress, playback stops. If you remove the USB device during recording, recording stops and the message "Storage media removed unsafely. Recording cancelled" displays. If you attach an unsupported USB device, the message "Unsupported USB device attached" appears.



Polycom recommends that you do not remove the USB device while playing back files. There is a small probability that the USB device itself may be damaged by this action.

#### Note

If you connect your USB device to your phone and the message "Unsupported USB device attached" displays, contact your system administrator about which USB devices are supported. Your phone's Launch Pad allows you to access local or web applications such as the Picture Frame application, local directories, and information feeds from your phone. Your system administrator can customize the applications you see.

By default, Launch Pad displays the following applications:

- Picture Frame (if the Picture Frame feature is enabled for your phone) to display the pictures you have on a USB flash drive. Using the Picture Frame application, you can display your pictures as thumbnails, one-by-one (like a slide show), or display just one picture. You can also use the Picture Frame application to set one of your pictures as the background image on your phone. (For information on how to use Picture Frame, see Displaying the Pictures that are Stored on Your USB Flash Drive on page 2-14.)
- My Info Portal (hosted by Polycom) to give you access to a variety of information feeds (for example, sports, news, weather, stock, and traffic). My Info Portal demonstrates the use of web services with your phone using Polycom XML APIs. Before you use My Info Portal, you have to enable it (see Enabling My Info Portal on page 4-33).

Your system administrator can set up your phone so that you can view feeds from the idle screen, as well as from Launch Pad.

Note

When you view feeds (either from Launch Pad or from the idle screen), your phone is considered idle, and a screen saver (if it is set up) will still display.

## **Accessing Launch Pad**

You access Launch Pad from the Applications menu.

#### To access applications using the Launch Pad:



The Launch Pad's main window displays.

By default, the Picture Frame application (if it is enabled for your phone) and My Info Portal application display. Your system administrator may have configured other applications or information to display.

Note If you previously exited a Launch Pad application without first returning to the Launch Pad's main window, or if a Launch Pad window times out, the next time you access Launch Pad, the last window you viewed will display, not the Launch Pad's main window. To display the Launch Pad's main window, tap the **Home** or **LaunchPad** soft key.



The following figure shows the Launch Pad's main window.

- **2.** Do one of the following:
  - To launch Picture Frame, tap the Picture Frame icon.
    - For information on how to use Picture Frame, see Displaying the Pictures that are Stored on Your USB Flash Drive on page 2-14.
  - To launch My Info Portal, tap the My Info Portal icon, and then tap the feed you want to view. (If you haven't enabled the My Info Portal application yet, you will have to set up an account before you can access the application. See Enabling My Info Portal on page 4-33.)
  - To launch another application, tap it.

For information on using other applications, see your system administrator.

From Launch Pad, you can do the following:

- To display the Launch Pad's main window (with all the Launch Pad applications), tap the **Home** soft key.
- To refresh the Launch Pad window so you can access an updated application, tap the **Refresh** soft key.
- To launch the previous application you viewed, tap the **Back** soft key.
- To return to the idle screen, tap the **Exit** soft key.

## **Enabling My Info Portal**

Before you can access the applications under My Info Portal, you have to sign up for a My Info Portal account.

**Note** Information you provide when you set up an account is securely transmitted using the HTTPS security protocol.

#### To enable My Info Portal:

**1.** Tap **Applications**, or press (APP).

The Launch Pad's main window displays.

**Note** If you previously exited a Launch Pad application without first returning to the Launch Pad's main window, or if a Launch Pad window times out, the next time you access Launch Pad, the last window you viewed will display, not the Launch Pad's main window. To display the Launch Pad's main window, tap the **Home** or **LaunchPad** soft key.



- 2. Tap the My Info Portal icon.
- **3.** From the My Info Portal Welcome screen, tap **Sign Up**, and then enter your account information. (For information on how to enter data, see Entering Data and Editing Fields on page 1-27.)
- 4. After you enter your account information, tap Sign Up.

If you tap **Main Menu**, you can now access the My Info Portal applications, and then view the information you want.

If your system administrator has set up My Info Portal to display on your idle screen, you will see information feeds from the idle screen.

## **Restarting Your Phone**

Periodically, you may need to restart your phone so the phone can accept a new configuration.

NoteIf your phone malfunctions, you may be able to restore normal operation without<br/>restarting it. Before you restart your phone, contact your system administrator.<br/>Call lists are automatically cleared when you restart the phone.

#### To restart the phone:

**1.** Tap **Settings > Basic > Restart Phone**.

The Restart Phone screen displays. The message "Are you sure?" displays.



**2.** If you still want to restart the phone, tap the **Yes** soft key. The restart process begins. The process ends when the idle screen displays.

# **Troubleshooting Your Phone**

This chapter contains general troubleshooting information to help you solve any problems you might encounter when you use your Polycom VVX 1500 phone. The tables in this chapter list possible trouble symptoms, the likely causes of these problems, and the recommended corrective actions to take.

Problems are grouped as follows:

- Power and Startup
- Controls
- Access to Screens and Systems
- Calling
- Displays
- Audio

To obtain more detailed troubleshooting information, you can access certain menus on your phone that test your phone hardware. For more information, see Testing Phone Hardware on page 5-7.

If you require additional assistance, contact your system administrator.

## Power and Startup

To test your phone hardware:
